ELDER ABUSE

Every year, 15 June marks World Elder Abuse Awareness Day (WEAAD). This internationally recognised day is an opportunity to highlight and oppose elder abuse. With 1 in 20 older people experiencing some form of abuse, this is a pernicious form of ageism which can lead to serious physical and psychological consequences.

When I experience ageism I usually just do a quick eye-roll but everyone should reconsider the way we think and speak about ageing and older people and remember that ageist attitudes can lead to elder abuse.

Ageism is a pervasive presence that impedes living and ageing well, can negatively affect the way services and care are provided, and is a barrier to older people participating in the workforce.

By definition, elder abuse is an act which causes either deliberate or unintentional harm to an older person.

Older people's right to safety, dignity and autonomy, and to be treated with respect is easily eroded.

It may be that older people are prevented from making their own decisions about their life, how and where they live, who they spend time with or how they deal with their finances.

Persistent and insidious devaluing of older people can spiral into abuse or mistreatment.

A recent webinar on the subject claimed a 40% increase in reported elder abuse cases over the last three years. Abuse can take many forms and is often a mix of two or more: emotional, social, neglect, financial, physical, sexual or chemical, most likely from someone they know and trust.

The 2021 National Elder Abuse Prevalence Study reported 1 in 6 older people experiencing abuse or mistreatment in the 12 months prior to the survey. Other reports showed 50% of elder abuse in SA was financial, usually mixed with emotional. Older women are most vulnerable.

If you suspect abuse or mistreatment of an adult who may be vulnerable, you can seek free confidential advice and support or make a report to the Adult Safeguarding Unit on 1800 372 310.
